340 CADETS PARTICIPATE



Florida Wing hosted the Southeast Region Girls Exchange (SERGE) during June and July to enlighten and inform the participants on the CAP activities in the progressive State of Florida.

The ten cadettes and two escort officers hailed from Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee, and Puerto Rico Wings. The cadettes were selected on their outstanding accomplishments, and represent their respective wings as they visit and learn the people within the host state.

Plans began long in advance by the Florida Wing Project Officer, 1st Lt. Billy Slater, being assisted by Captain Nancy Klose, as well as the many sector, group and squadron personnel.

Arriving in Sector C, the gates of St. Augustine, home of the Santa Rosa Cadet Squadron, the cadettes were met by the East Duval Group 25 Project Officer, S/M Mary Jane Downs, and Lt. Robert Hendren, Santa Rosa Squadron Commander.

Throughout the first day, they went on sightseeing tours of the city, including the Fountain of Youth, and the Castillo de San Marco. The evening was topped off with a beach party and a play "Cross and Sword," the story of the City of St. Augustine, held at the amphitheater.

The next morning following breakfast, they toured the rest of the city by train, with a stop just long enough for lunch.

Completing the last night with a dinner and dance, Lt. Colonel Otis L. Phillips, Sector C Commander, and Major William G. Kobos, Group 25 Commander, were the guest speak-

ers. From St. Augustine, the cadettes went on to Cocoa and Daytona, and then home, completing another successful Florida Wing exchange program with the wings of the Southeast Region.

WING SARCAP

The annual Florida Wing Emergency Services SAR effectiveness evaluation will be held Saturday and Sunday, September 10th and 11th at the Lake City Airport.

Sunday, the Southeast Region Liaison Office team will start the effectiveness evaluation at 6:00 A.M., lasting until 1:00 P.M.

It is expected that there will be approximately sixty-five aircraft registered to participate.


JACKSONVILLE- Each year the Civil Air Patrol, selects outstanding cadets for its National, Regional and Wing Cadet Special Activities and Florida Wing, contributed to the "cream of the crop."

New Mission For CAP

The Civil Air Patrol has been requested by the North Florida Eye Bank, located in the J. Hillis Miller Health Center at the University of Florida, Gainesville, to transport precious eye tissue from where it is available to its destination when there is a need for it. In instances where tissue becomes available in areas remote from Gainesville, it is anticipated a commercial airline will carry the "rush" cargo to the nearest large city, and from there it would be the Civil Air Patrol's responsibility the rest of the way in.

With a time limit of twenty-four hours from tissue procurement to transplant, time is of the essence. Weather permitting, Civil Air Patrol's light aircraft would fit the commitment in a first-class fashion.

Florida residents are aware of the dilemma facing the State's Highway Patrol and other law enforcement agencies. Being extremely short of personnel and working excessive hours has drained most of their potential for extra services such as this one, which they have been handling. They have been forced to ask for relief.

Accordingly, the Civil Air Patrol, with its best record of effectiveness, dependability, willingness and promptness in assisting, has stepped in with the hope of providing alleviation. Built around versatility, on which it thrives, the Civil Air Patrol may soon be called on to provide this new and unique link in its chain of life-saving functions.

Unique Training

Recently, cadets of the Orlando Cadet Squadron aided in the construction of a Viet Cong village, used for training Special Forces personnel. The co-operation between CAP and the military forms a vital link in the training necessary to survive the guerrilla warfare in Viet Nam.

One of the members of the squadron, Cadet Thomas O'Hare, has manned the village since its construction, playing the part of one of the insurgents. Tom has done such an outstanding job that he was featured in the August 5th issue of Life Magazine.

Summer Soaring



C/1Lt. Kevin M. Frye of West Jacksonville Cadet Squadron, recently completed the two week Glider Pilot Course at Chester, South Carolina.

Cadet Frye was one of three Florida Wing cadets selected to attend the first Glider Encampment at Bermuda High Soaring Inc. He made a total of thirty-eight flights and accumulated a total of ten and a half hours qualifying in the Schweizer SGS 1-26, SGU 2-22 "C" and "E" models.

He qualified for the Federation Aeronautique Internationale "A" "B" and "C" Awards, received his Private Pilot (Glider) License and a membership in the Soaring Society of America.

A sixteen year old junior at Bishop Kenny High School, Cadet Frye has been a CAP Cadet for three years. He has been a student pilot since January, soloing in a Cessna 150 in February and now has a total of thirty hours of powered flying time. His future plans are to make a career of military aviation.

And where was Mr. Maynard?

'Long about 1530 hours on Saturday of the Oakland Park Cadet Squadron's bivouac, this was the major question in camp. A SARCAP had been planned and executed with Mr. Maynard as the "victim," but it didn't quite happen that way.

The squadron left to look for their victim while he was still sleeping in camp. When he awoke, Mr. Maynard found the camp deserted, and left at about 1330, close behind the squadron.

Knowing the "searchers" had gone north, with the intention of swinging west and then south to return to camp, he decided to head northwest and be there when the squadron found him. If and when...

About a mile from camp, the "victim" began to look for somewhere to await his rescue. At 1430 he found a peaceful hilltop shaded by a palm and two pine trees. Here he conspicuously (?) displayed his orange flight suit from a tree and settled down for a nap, with the thought that someone surely would find him.

Meanwhile, back with the "searchers," the cadets were diving into grass-filled ditches and struggling up the other side only to disappear into eight foot weeds and more ditches. Among the stalks a fatigue cap would occasionally appear as the "searchers" fought their way through the tangled jungle of weeds. Then across the ocean of sand, ever-sinking, they trudged behind a long range back toward camp. But nowhere in his wilderness was Mr. Maynard.

Half an hour later, our "victim" awoke to a breeze and the thought "when are they gonna come fine me?" No hear, no see. Nothing to do but rest until help comes.

While back at the camp, the "searchers" were recovering from their trek, happily swimming in the river. Their "victim" not having returned, they called a REDCAP, and went out again.
