GOVERNOR KIRK PRESENTS SPAATZ AWARD

Governor Claude R. Kirk presented to Cadet Colonel Kevin M. Frye the third General Carl A. Spaatz Award in the State of Florida, on March 16th.

Cadet Frye is the youngest of the thirty two cadets in the nation to achieve this award.

The qualifications for the award, which include the completion of an examination on Civil Air Patrol Aerospace Education, Physical Fitness, Moral Leadership and Military Leadership Programs, were explained to Governor Kirk by Major John L. Garrison, USAF-CAP Liaison Officer for the Florida Wing.

Governor Kirk, in his presentation, stated that Cadet Frye is more typical of the American youth of today, rather than the image of a long-haired, draft-card burning teenager. He also stated that this was a truly outstanding accomplishment for such a young man, who would follow in his father's footsteps."

It was brought to everyone's attention that Cadet Frye's father, who is a Chief Warrant Officer in the U.S. Navy, served on the USS New Jersey along with Governor Kirk, who at that time was a Second Lieutenant in the US Marine Corps.

Cadet Colonel Frye, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Warren A. Frye, who are also members of the Civil Air Patrol, was born January 11, 1950, and is originally from Newport, Rhode Island.

He joined the Cadet Program in 1963, as a member of the West Jacksonville Cadet Squadron, and has steadily advanced through the Cadet Training Program to be able to complete this stringent examination, which has been adopted by National Headquarters of the Civil Air Patrol, and endorsed by the United States Air Force. He earned his Certificate of Proficiency in May, 1965, and the Amelia Earhart Award in April, 1966.

During his cadet career thus far he has held twelve cadet leadership positions from Cadet Squad Leader to Cadet Commander and to his present position of Group 24 Chairman of the Florida Wing Cadet Advisory Council. He has attended three Summer Encampments and two Cadet Command and Staff Schools.

Among his other accomplishments he was selected as the Group 24 "Outstanding Cadet" in 1965 and 1966.

Having started his aviation career at the age of sixteen, he received his student pilot ticket on the 18th of January, 1966, and soloed on February 12. He was select-

ed for the 1966 CAP Glider Encampment which was held at Chester, South Carolina, where he graduated with his private glider pilots certificate and the Glider "A", "B" and "C" Awards. At the recent Florida Wing Cadet Special Activities Selection he was selected to be a participant of the 1967 CAP Power Pilot Encampment, where upon completion he will receive his private pilot's license. He has plans for a military aviation career after high school and college.

On behalf of the National Commander, and the Commander of the Florida Wing of the Civil Air Patrol, Lt. Colonel Otis L. Phillips, Deputy Wing Commander, presented an Honorary Civil Air Patrol Membership Certificate to Governor Claude R. Kirk, for which the governor expressed his gratitude and asked, "Does this entitle me to fly?"

The presentations were both held in the Cabinet Room of the State Capitol in Tallahassee, and were attended by various state and Civil Air Patrol dignitaries.

Pre-Encampment

Local preparations for orienting cadets on the functions of a summer encampment have begun with an inter-group simulated summer encampment for Groups 19, 24 and 25, held at the Naval Air Station in Jacksonville on March 18th and 19th.

Starting at 1000 hours on Saturday, the cadets checked in to their barracks under the supervision of the seniors. A briefing was held and assignments made. Then all personnel marched to the mess hall for chow.

Members of the 679th Radar Squadron gave an orientation tour of the facilities, including its important functions insuring security and operational assistance. All cadets were given the opportunity to actually view the radar scopes and receive instruction from the Air Force operators.

Following the tour of the radar installation the cadets were escorted through the VW-4 Hanger 123, which houses the hurricane hunter aircraft that penetrate hurricanes and advise the weather bureau of a hurricane's location and intensity. This tour was ended with a motion picture of actual operational practices during a hurricane.

That evening after chow all cadets and seniors were guests at the base theatre.

Reveille came at 6:00 a.m. Sunday, followed by an inspection, chow and church. By 12:00 noon all was secured and the personnel returned home.

During this simulated encampment, all activities of the 56 cadets and 8 seniors present were conducted with strict military bearing.

Inter-Group Bivouac and Practice SARCAP

Recently there was an inter-group bivouac and practice Emergency Services SARCAP at the Fernandina Beach Airport, with Groups 19, 24 and 25 participating.

Group 9 Headquarters and the Nassau Senior Squadron hosted the week-end activity which had 62 cadets and 28 senior members receiving the training.

Cadet Colonel Kevin M. Frye, with his cadet staff, conducted all activities under the supervision of seniors who were instructors and escorts.

The classes, which began Saturday morning, included First Aid, Communications, Flight Line Operations and Mission Administration.

Dancing for all was the social event of the evening.

Using the instruction from the day before the cadets were given the problem of performing a simulated search and rescue mission of Sunday.

Establishing the mission headquarters, along with communications supported by nine mobile units, an operations section and ground rescue teams, the cadets proceeded to successfully complete the problem.

During the mission the cadets were evaluated on their proficiency in fulfilling their assigned position responsibilities. Acknowledgement of their accomplishments was made at the end of the mission.

Visiting the activity from Wing Headquarters were Lt. Col. James Paxton, DCS/Communications, Major Betty Paxton, Personnel Officer, Captain Ray Eddy, Wing Information Officer, and CWO Alma Eddy, Assistant Information Officer.

TASK FORCE NUMBER 3

It has been announced recently that the Headquarters for Task Force #3 would be located in Jacksonville, with Major Joseph Heape as Commander.

The area for Task Force #3 has been designated to cover the northeast section of Florida, to include Jacksonville, St. Augustine, Gainesville, Lake City and Ocala.

The Task Force concept has been established by the Wing DCS/Operations, Lt. Col. E. K. Johnson, throughout the entire wing, to better utilize the units in particular areas to assist in the Emergency Services Operations that have to be performed by Civil Air Patrol.

Each Task Force is divided into sub-areas with mission headquarters at key airports so that these areas can be controlled for more efficient air and ground operations.

The Headquarters for Task Force #3 will be in the CAP building located on Craig Field in Jacksonville. This will house the mission headquarters and communications center which will feed all information to the sub-area mission headquarters.

Assisting Major Heape is Captain Albert R. Oelsner, Group 9 Commander, who will be the Deputy Task Force Commander, and Major Betty Scheufler as the Information Officer.

IN MEMORIAM HERBERT PERRY Lt. Colonel, Civil Air Patrol

Florida Wing has lost a long-time active member with the passing of Lt. Colonel Herbert Perry, Commander of Group 12.

Col. Perry, who was fifty-four, suffered a heart attack while shopping at a neighborhood store in Gainesville on February 2, 1967, and died shortly thereafter.

He was assigned as the Group 12 Commander in late 1965, with prior CAP active service as Sector C Inspector and Communications Officer of Group 6.

The military funeral that was held on February 4th was attended by Col. Ralph T. Gwinn, Commander of the Florida Wing, several wing staff officers and senior and cadet members of Group 12. The funeral services were conducted by the Reverend C. Edward Murfin, Jr. of Gainesville.

During his service in the Civil Air Patrol, Col. Perry was responsible for many accomplishments within his units and was representative of an outstanding Civil Air Patrol member.

SARCAP

The Annual Florida Wing Emergency Services SAR Evaluation is to be held April 15th and 16th at Stuart, Florida.

As one of the major responsibilities of the Civil Air Patrol, to provide land and air operational assistance in an emergency, the personnel in all units of the Florida Wing support this vital mission. Each year the wing is evaluated on its abilities in the performance of such missions.

The evaluation will be conducted by members of the Southeast Region Headquarters and the USAF-CAP Regional Liaison Office.

It has been disclosed by Major Donald Cunningham, Mission Co-ordinator, that all units will receive detailed information concerning the location, times and facilities in the regular wing mail distribution.

Major James Lawrence, Mission Deputy for Cadets, stated that all cadets are welcomed to attend. There will be a bivouac area along with a dance for the participating cadets. It has been requested, however, that each unit bringing cadets provide a senior escort.

New Building

The Daytona Beach Senior Squadron will move to a new permanent meeting place soon, according to the unit's Commander, 1Lt. Merritt Powell.

This has been accomplished with negotiations with Mr. William Curran of Pasco Steel Company and the City of Daytona Beach.

It has been established that Pasco Steel Company will erect a 60 by 80 foot pre-fabricated steel building which will be located on land leased to the Civil Air Patrol located at the municipal airport.

The members of the unit will lay the foundation and complete the interior of the building.

As well as a location for the meetings to include senior and cadet programs, it will also be mission headquarters for all operational activities required in the Civil Air Patrol Emergency Services Program.

CAP Airport

According to 1Lt. Remington R. Taylor, Commander of the West Pasco Composite Squadron, arrangements have been made to improve the condition of the unit's headquarters.

Recently the West Pasco Squadron of Hudson, Florida received its new unit headquarters at the Hodnett Airpark.

The unit has been leased the Hodnett Airpark for the purpose of conducting the CAP Senior and Cadet Programs along with its Emergency Services Programs.

Work has already begun on getting the installation operational. The unit has been assisted by the U. S. 19 Volunteer Fire Department, which cleared and burned the land surrounding the runway to clear the approaches.

Clearing the land for the addition of a second runway has also been started.

The Annual Wing Meeting and Cadet Awards Ball are the events of the Florida Wing that everyone looks forward to in January at Orlando.

This year, with a record attendance, there were meetings in all areas that every member could obtain knowledge and a better understanding of the operation of the Civil Air Patrol.

The Cadet Office, under Lt. Colonel William R. Bass, covered the importance of an effective Cadet program on a local level, as well as the International Air Cadet Exchange, the Flying Encampments and the other Special Activities that are offered cadets. The 1967 Summer Encampments and other related programs were discussed, with a challenge for all units to have Florida Wing's Cadet Program become CAP's best.

In the cadet program, the emergency services program and the senior training program a doctor is always needed; these were the points that were stressed to all personnel attending the Medical Officers meeting, headed by Lt. Col. R. H. Saber, Wing Medical Officer. Col. Saber explained how the responsibilities of all units which have the advantage of having a medical officer effect the progress of the whole CAP program.

The communications network of the wing, use of the correct procedures and maintenance of equipment, as well as the increase in the number of radios in the wing, were a few of the highlights of the communications meeting manned by Lt. Col. J. W. Paxton, Wing DCS/Communications.

Colonel Ralph T. Gwinn, Wing Commander, in the Group Commanders meeting, covered the importance of a more unified wing with strong support from groups and units. He outlined the goals in all facets of the organization and stressed to the commanders their important role.



At the Annual Awards Ball in 1964 he was selected to participate in the Southeast Region Orientation Course. In 1965 he was a participant of the International Air Cadet Exchange and visited the country of El Salvador. Being selected to participate in the Cadet Flying Encampment Program brought his his private pilots license and wings in 1966. The evening he received his General Carl A. Spaatz Award it was announced that he had been selected for the 1967 Cadet Flying Encampment "Glider," where upon completion he will receive his glider wings.

As a student in the University of South Florida, he is majoring in Economics and plans to do graduate work, then go into the Air Force.

Each year the Florida Wing selects its outstanding cadets to participate in the Annual Civil Air Patrol Cadet Special Activities Programs. The cadets are given a written examination, and then appear before a board composed of senior members that evaluate their bearing, uniform, and knowledge of Aerospace Education, Military Leadership, Moral Leadership, Current Events and CAP Knowledge.

There were thirty-eight primaries and twelve alternates selected to participate in the 1967 Special Activities Programs.







NEW NATIONAL COMMANDER ANNOUNCED

On April 6, 1967, Headquarters Continental Air Command, announced that effective May 1, 1967, Brigadier General William W. Wilcox will assume command of the Civil Air Patrol. General Wilcox is currently Commander of Strategic Air Command's 19th Air Division at Carswell Air Force Base. The change of command relieving Colonel Joe L.
