JOLLY NAMES NEW FLORIDA WING COMMANDER

Col. Oscar Jolly, Southeast Region Commander

Named LCol. Richard Leali to succeed Colonel Henri Casenove as Wing Commander of Florida Wing. Colonel Casenove will remain in command until July 31 1977 at which time LCol. Leali will assume command. The change of command will take place at the Region Conference on July 29 and 30. (see the registration form on Pg. 7)

Florida Wing has consistently been among the top wings in the nation under the able leadership of Col. Henri Casenove. Now Colonel Casenove, who will be honored at the Southeast Region Conference, will relinquish command to LCol. Richard L. Leali, Sr. LColonel Dick Leali will assume his new position on 31 July 1977. "Luck and success in your new venture" has been expressed for him by Colonel Casenove.

LColonel Leali has a long and enviable record in CAP. He is the holder of a meritorious service award and two exceptional service awards. He began his twenty years of service to CAP as a cadet in Florida Wing. The University Cadet Squadron of Group 10 was one of three units organized by LCol. Leali. Under his leadership University Cadet Squadron was the number one squadron in the wing with a cadet membership of over a hundred. At various times Groups 1, 10, 12 and 18 have been under his command. He has held various wing staff positions including Deputy for Cadets and Wing Executive officer. As Deputy for Cadets, LColonel Leali organized Florida Wings First flying encampment. At National Headquarters CAP LColonel Leali served as the Chairman's Advisor for the Cadet Program and Chairman of the National Cadet Program Advisory Committee. In addition he was selected as an escort for IACE to Austria and has served as project officer for IACE,

SE Region Girls Exchange and Eastern Airlines-CAP Stewardess School. Numerous summer encampments and Type B's have been commanded by LColonel Leali. He is a mission qualified observer with an interest in search and rescue. He is employed by Citizen's Federal Savings and Loan Association of Miami where he is vice president and treasurer. In addition LColonel Leali is the Vice president of the South Florida Financial Managers Association. He is the "Chief" of his local Indian Guides Tribe and this past season was a winner as a coach of a Khoury League team. His wife, Mary, also is an active CAPer and former cadet and together they have five children.

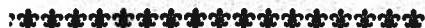

Wing Effectiveness Evaluation Program

It is the way that we all are graded by our National Headquarters. It was formerly known as the National Commanders Evaluation.

We are being graded on the basis of the reports that we submit to National HQ describing our efforts as well as the results of the efforts themselves.

Example: Let's say that you go out to a local civic club to talk about Civil Air Patrol in your community and how they might assist us. While there, you talk one person into coming to a meeting with his/her family and they join. The recruiting effort is evident in the statistics on membership provided by National and thus the points are almost automatic for recruiting. The points for the I/O program are not. Here is one place that your spending another 2 minutes to drop a note to your unit I/O to use for their report will help a lot.

Safety reports are even easier. Just answer a couple of questions and return the form to the Wing Safety Officer. We can earn max points by reading his bulletins at a meeting and checking it off on his form.

Get all of your fellow members active, and achieving. Level 1,2,3,4 for seniors, Mitchell, Earhardt, Spatz for cadets. And above all, report the activities that you are using to get and keep your members. The key word for WEEP is REPORT.

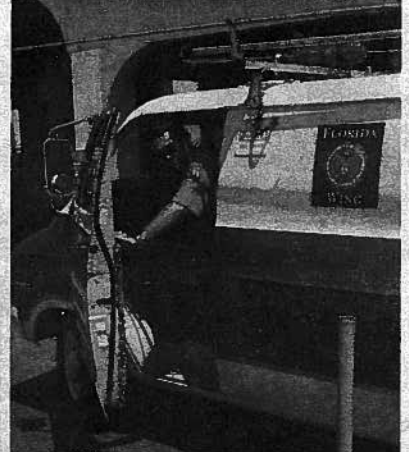
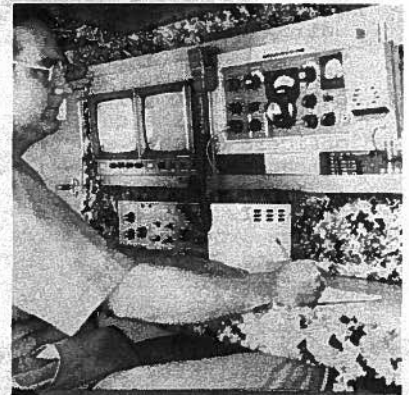

Congratulations Ken and Associates for a job well done.



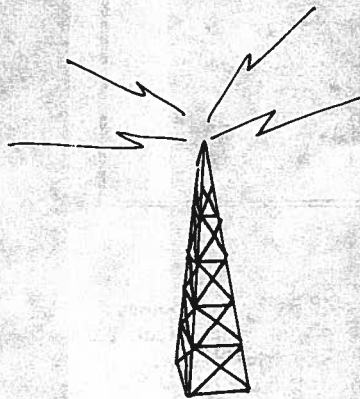
Short shorts

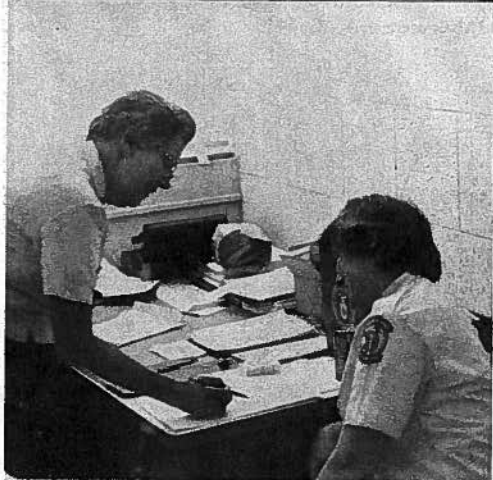
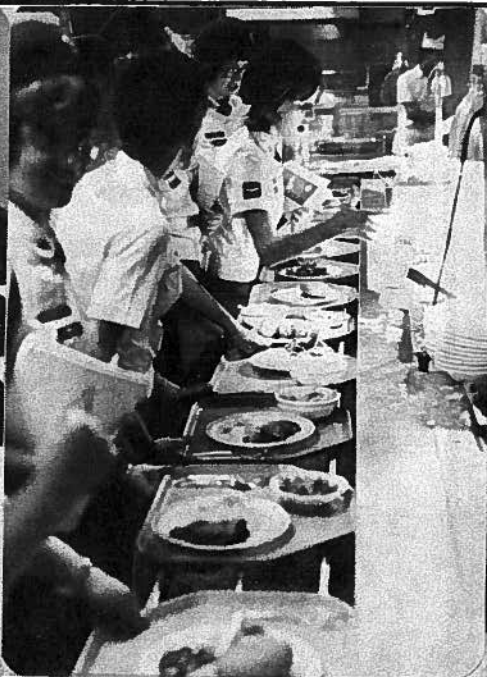
Some of the activities that were included this year that was not last year was the tour of the V.A.B. building on the cape and a more in depth look of the space program.

Maj. John Homzak, Director of Cadet Programs, did his best this year to keep the rising price of the type "A" down.

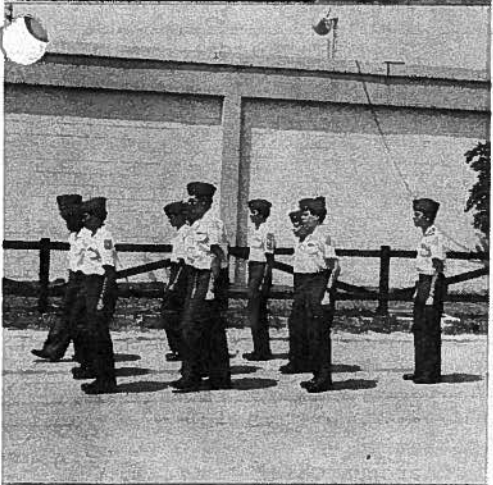
CADET EDITOR

1Lt. Ruth Hubert recently received her Senior Pilots Wings. This award is further evidence of an interest in flying which extends over thirty years.

A native of Lakeland, Ruth became involved with aviation and Civil Air Patrol at about the same time. For the first two years of WW II, as a charter member of Polk County Sr. Sq. she took part in such activities as Search and Rescue, bomb alerts, and dropped Armed Forces recruiting leaflets throughout the county.

In 1974 she rejoined CAP, with the Pinellas Senior Sq. She is a Mission Pilot and puts her training and expertise to good use on Cadet Orientation Flights.

This year Ruth is the Honorary Chairman of the thirtieth and final Powder Puff Derby. This is in recognition of her work at the first "Women" Intercontinental Air Race in 1947. As Chairman of the '99's, she helped promote and produce the first of a series of events which came to be known as the Powder Puff Derby and which the Smithsonian Institute calls, "their milestone in flight."

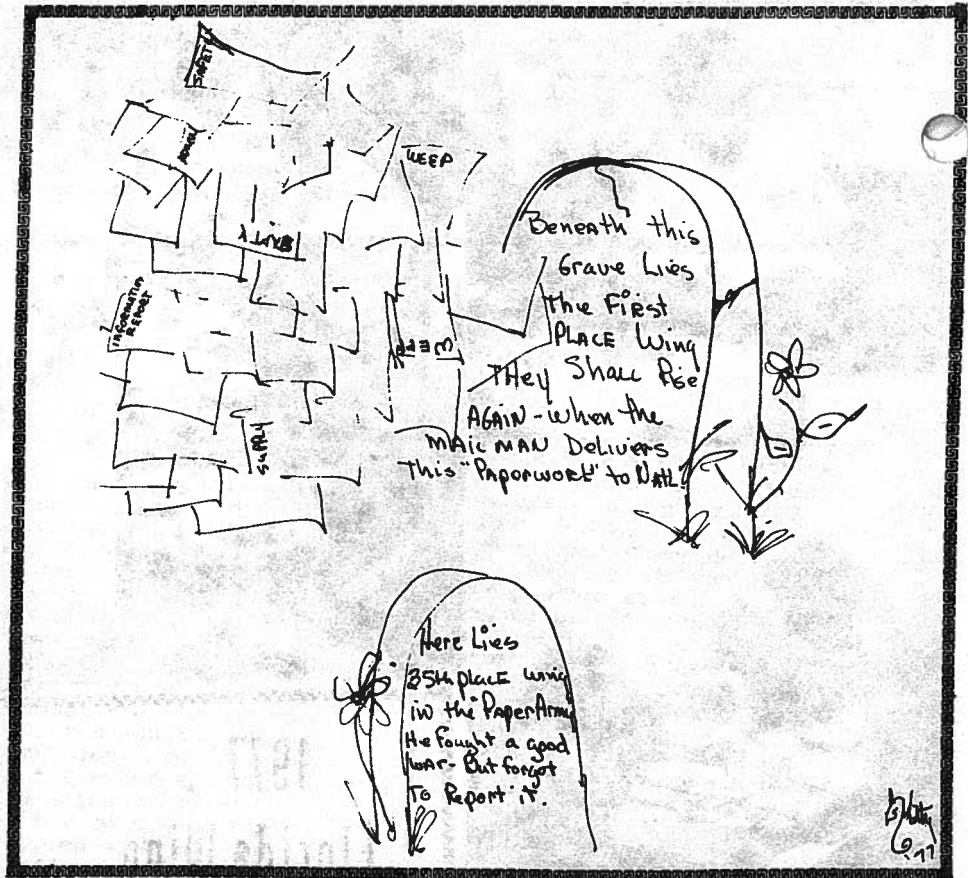

ELTs and Illegal Drugs

From the Colorado CAP Flyer;

The Drug Enforcement Administration reports that persons engaged in the distribution of illicit drugs are using emergency locator transmitters (ELT) as a part of their operations. During an exclusive interview with James Burke, acting Regional Director of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), Burke told the CAP Flyer that Civil Air Patrol members must be aware of the dangers they face while tracking ELTs.

During the past few years the DEA has been attempting to educate persons living in rural areas and airport operators about the use of aircraft in illegal drug operations. Apparently the airport operators were successfully educated because the DEA began receiving reports of suspicious operations around aircraft at airports. After a few dealers were apprehended at airports the word got around and they began using remote stretches of roadway. This mode of operation soon became known to local law enforcement officers and the DEA. Soon these dealers and their employees were being arrested and convicted. Just recently a large operation involving aircraft was broken up in New Mexico. The bandits even went to the trouble of removing road signs from the side of the road to prevent the aircraft's wings from contacting the road signs. With the pressure once again on, the bandits had to find another mode of operation.

This most recent mode of operation involves the ELT and parachutes. Burke says the bandits are now parachuting their illicit drugs to ground. The chutes are equipped with ELTs and the ground crews equipped with DF equipment. The operation is an obvious one, the ELT is activated, the chute and package is dropped and the ground crews DF their way to the package of illicit drugs. Burke says

the bandits apparently can't be bothered with changing the frequency of the ELT so it goes off on 121.5 and 243.0.

Burke says most of the drops the DEA is aware of are taking place in the Four Corners area near Cortez and over the eastern Colorado plains. Thus far only one group of people allegedly using ELTs have been arrested, but Burke says he's sure the use of the ELT is widespread.

Chances are that an ELT in a dropped package would not be on long enough for CAP to be activated by the AFRCC, but the possibility does exist. A strong possibility exists that CAP members could come in contact with these bandits if the ELT were inadvertently activated inside a car or structure after the bandits returned to an urban area. Burke warns that the danger to CAP ground personnel tracking an ELT in the possession of an illegal drug dealer is extremely high. "Many of the dealers are users and could be very unstable people; Burke warns. When a CAP member comes in contact with these people they may think he is a DEA agent or other law enforcement officer. Burke points to the incident west of Limon where a Colorado state patrolman innocently stopped a pickup truck containing two drug dealers. The patrolman was murdered.

When CAP ground personnel come close to locating an activated ELT off of an airport they must contact local law enforcement authorities for further assistance. This is not to be construed as a law enforcement activity. The presence of law officers is strictly to provide safety to CAP members should the ELT be tracked to illicit drug dealers.
